CONNECTION TO HIV TESTING & LINKAGE TO CARE (TLC) ACT

Ensuring that everyone gets tested for HIV is a core strategy of the Getting to Zero Illinois (GTZ-IL) plan to end the HIV epidemic by 2030. Testing, linkage to care, and HIV treatment are widely recognized as the three critical arms of HIV prevention, especially when prioritized among the Black, Latine, and LGBTQ+ communities disproportionately impacted by HIV.

THE ISSUES

TESTING


According to the CDC, 13.3% of the total U.S. population of people living with HIV are undiagnosed. CDC recommends that all adolescents and adults aged 13–64 years be tested for HIV at least once. There are 42,942 Illinoisans living with HIV, including the estimated 5,711 people who are undiagnosed. It is thought that 38% of all new HIV transmissions occur from those who are undiagnosed.

STIGMA

Studies have shown that people with greater HIV-related prejudice and stigma are associated with decreased HIV testing rates and may cause people at risk for HIV or living with the disease to delay or fail to access care.

RACIAL DISPARITIES AND BARRIERS TO CARE

People with HIV who are not engaged in care are more likely to be Black, young, and have unmet needs across several areas (e.g., finances, mental health, and more) than those in care, according to the O'Neill Institute.



To end the HIV epidemic in Illinois, we must prioritize ending the epidemic in Black and Latine communities. Ending the HIV epidemic is a health equity and racial justice issue.

THE SOLUTIONS

The Connection to HIV TLC Act will support:



TECTING

Mandate insurers and Medicaid provide coverage for home test kits for sexually transmitted infections, including HIV, without cost-sharing.



EDUCATION

Ensure that all county jails provide HIV/ AIDS education to incarcerated individuals and visitors and link them to HIV testing as mandated by Illinois' County Jail Act, in partnership with the Illinois Department of Corrections and Illinois Department of Public Health.



TREATMENT

Create eight Rapid Start for HIV Treatment pilot sites that will initiate antiretroviral therapy within 7 days of initial diagnosis or within 7 days of referral to HIV medical care.
